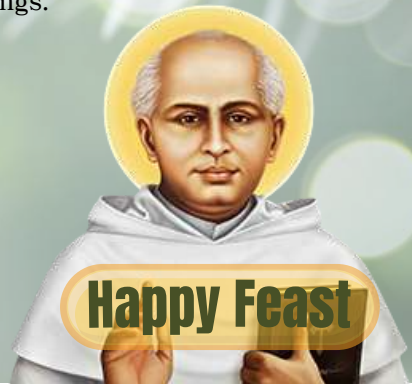

CHRISTMAS JOY IN COMMUNITY LIVING

Christmas joy is never a solitary feeling; it is a profoundly communal experience. The birth of Jesus was not announced to a single individual but to a community, the shepherds keeping watch in the fields. Joy becomes complete only when it is shared. True joy deepens when we allow others into our lives. A joyful community is one where every member finds space to laugh, celebrate, forgive, and hope together. Christmas invites us to look at one another not as co-residents, but as companions on the journey.

St. Francis of Assisi once said: "Wherever brothers and sisters come together, show that they are members of one family. If a mother, out of blood-relation, loves her child this much, brothers should love each other even more, for they are related through their commitment." Psalm 133 echoes the same spirit: "How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity! It is like precious oil poured on the head, running down on the beard of Aaron... like the dew of Hermon falling on Mount Zion." But we must ask ourselves honestly: Why are our CMI communities not becoming like that precious oil flowing down Aaron's beard? Why are our communities not like the refreshing dew of Hermon falling on Mount Zion? These questions remind us that we still have miles to go to become icons of joy, heralds of the Good News, and credible witnesses to the Gospel. Today, many of our communities risk becoming Google communities, places where information is abundant but genuine relationships are scarce. What we need instead is a "Giggling Community," a family where we witness to Christ with joy, humor, warmth, and togetherness. Christmas calls us to conduct a true self-appraisal.



Joy in Simple Living: “Bethlehem Spirituality” teaches us that joy does not come from abundance but from simplicity, from gratitude rather than comparison. When complaints decrease and appreciation increases, joy rises naturally. Every person in the community carries a spark of God. Recognizing Christ in the ordinary faces around us is the birthplace of joy. A community that honors every member, strong or weak, cheerful or burdened, becomes a living Bethlehem.

Joy through Generous Sharing: The manger was simple, yet it attracted generous hearts, Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the Magi. Generosity transforms ordinary communities into families. Sharing time, talents, responsibilities, and even small acts of service weaves threads of communion. Sharing is not about giving “things” but giving oneself. Generosity breaks isolation and nurtures gratitude.

Joy through Reconciliation: Christmas is God’s great reconciliation project, God becoming human to bridge the vast distance between heaven and earth. If God could cross such a distance, can we not take a few steps toward one another? Community life inevitably involves misunderstandings and hurts. Christmas invites us to disarm our hearts, let go of grudges, and rebuild trust. Reconciliation unleashes a joy that sets the whole community free.

The dream of our beloved founder, St. Chavara, was that every CMI community may become a Besrauma, a house set on high, visible to all as a beacon of communion, joy and holiness. Today, our CMI cry must be: “Return to Besrauma.” Our lives become meaningful and our discipleship authentic when people, who meet us, regardless of their background, can say: “When I grow up, I want to be like you.” Though we have lofty ideals, reality often reminds us of our imperfections and limitations. This humility is a grace, urging us to work together to build genuine Besrauma communities. Christmas is not merely a season; it is a school of communion where joy deepens, sharing expands and reconciliation heals. When each member performs even one simple act of love, the whole community becomes a Bethlehem of Joy, a place where Christ is born again, not in a manger, but in our very midst.

THE CALL OF THE SHEPHERDS: LISTENING TO GOD'S VOICE IN RELIGIOUS LIFE

The Christmas narrative is filled with profound symbols, but among the most striking figures are the humble shepherds who first received the announcement of Christ's birth. Their simple yet decisive response to God's call offers a timeless model for consecrated men and women, inviting us to a deeper obedience, availability, and openness to the surprises of God. In the quiet of Bethlehem's night, the shepherds teach us what it means to listen with the heart — a listening that lies at the center of every authentic religious vocation.

1. A God Who Speaks in Ordinary Places

The shepherds were not in the Temple, nor among the learned. They were ordinary laborers tending their flocks in the stillness of the night. Yet it was precisely there that "the glory of the Lord shone around them" (Lk 2:9). This divine initiative reminds us that God's voice often breaks into the ordinary circumstances of life. He chooses simple places and simple hearts. Pope Benedict XVI once said, "God comes in smallness. He makes Himself small so that we can understand Him, welcome Him, and love Him" (Homily, Christmas Eve 2006).

Religious life begins not with grand gestures but with the quiet grace of God's whisper. It is usually in the ordinariness of our daily duties, routines, and encounters that His call emerges. Like the shepherds, we are invited to stay spiritually awake - attentive to grace, alert to divine interruptions, open to the unexpected.

2. The Shepherds' Fear and God's Assurance

The Gospel tells us that the shepherds were "terrified" when the angel appeared (Lk 2:9). Fear is a natural human response when God draws near. The call to religious life, too, can evoke similar feelings: fear of surrender, fear of the unknown, fear of losing control. Yet the angel's words echo across every vocation story: "Do not be afraid" (Lk 2:10).

St. John Paul II insisted, "Do not be afraid to give your life to Christ. He takes nothing away, and He gives you everything." Religious life becomes possible only when we allow grace to move us from fear to trust. Obedience, then, is not a burdensome command but a loving response to God's fidelity. It is the courage to allow God to lead us beyond our comfort zones and preconceived plans.

3. Prompt Obedience: "Let Us Go to Bethlehem"

The shepherds' response is immediate: "Let us go, then, to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place" (Lk 2:15). They do not delay, question, bargain, or wait for better circumstances. Their obedience is joyful, prompt, and faith-filled.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that obedience is an act of “listening with the heart” (CCC 144), a surrender to the truth revealed by God. In religious life, the vow of obedience is not blind submission but a discerning openness to God’s will mediated through the Church, the community, and the signs of the times. Like the shepherds, consecrated persons are called to walk quickly toward the places where God Manifests Himself - often in unexpected ways.

4. Encounter Leads to Mission

Upon reaching the manger, the shepherds find “Mary and Joseph, and the infant lying in the manger” (Lk 2:16). Their journey culminates in an encounter - simple, silent, and transformative. They behold the Word made flesh, the God who became small for our sake. Every religious vocation is rooted in such an encounter with Christ. Pope Francis frequently reminds consecrated persons: “Everything begins with an encounter with Jesus that changes your life.” Without this, religious life becomes mere activism; with it, mission flows naturally.

After seeing the Child, the shepherds “made known the message” (Lk 2:17). They become the first evangelizers of the Incarnation. Their hearts overflow into proclamation. Likewise, consecrated men and women, having experienced God’s tenderness, are called to make His presence known through ministries of education, healing, pastoral service, and humble witness. Evangelization is not an external duty but the fruit of hearts touched by God.

5. Open to God’s Surprises

Nothing in the shepherds’ lives suggested they would be entrusted with the first news of the Savior’s birth. God surprised them - and they allowed themselves to be surprised. Religious life, too, unfolds under the sign of divine unpredictability. The Holy Spirit constantly invites us to new paths, new communities, new missionary horizons.

Pope Francis beautifully states, “God is the God of surprises; He always loves to surprise us” (Homily, 2014). This requires vigilance, prayer, and inner freedom. The shepherds leave their flocks — an act of radical trust — to follow God’s call. Similarly, every consecrated person must be willing to let go of securities to discover God’s surprising grace.

Conclusion: Listening Hearts in a Noisy World

In a world saturated with noise, the shepherds remind us that only those who cultivate silence, humility, and attentiveness can truly hear God’s voice. Their response becomes a paradigm for religious life: listening deeply, obeying promptly, encountering Christ intimately, and proclaiming joyfully. As we contemplate the shepherds at Bethlehem, may every consecrated person rediscover the beauty of being called, the freedom of obedience, and the joy of being surprised by God. Their simple journey to a manger continues to echo as an invitation: “Let us go to Bethlehem” — to the places where God waits to reveal Himself anew.

Hermits and Asceticism

There is no doubt that, at heart, every religious carries within a hermit's calling. To abandon everything, withdraw into the forest, and live a life of solitude—being alone with the Alone—is the fullest expression of consecrated life. Fr. Seban (his name in poorvasram), now known as Christhananda, stands as a living example of an authentic hermit. The author considers himself fortunate to have visited Christhananda's hermitage, Atmeswar, on several occasions and to have experienced the profound spiritual atmosphere—the very “vibes” of a genuine ascetic and true hermit—there. Inspired by this grace, the author chose to celebrate his birthday every year at Atmeswar, in the company of Christhananda and like-minded seekers, in the Gir forest.

We may recall that saints such as St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara, Fr. Porukara, and Fr. Palackal initially desired a life of solitude in the forest, which eventually evolved into the ashram tradition. With this background, let us reflect on the lives of some genuine hermits of the Church.

Prasanna Devi, popularly known as Mataji, lived a heroic ascetic life at Atmeswar for nearly forty years. Her holiness and simplicity touched not only people but even wild animals, who seemed to sense compassion in her eyes—as she did in theirs. People from all castes and creeds found solace and peace in her presence. Atmeswar, where Mataji lived, became a place of many divine interventions. Mataji believed that the man who instructed her to build a hut there was Jesus himself, for after showing her the place, the man disappeared into the dense forest and was never seen again.

One remarkable sign was the discovery of water during a severe drought in Gujarat. Mataji prayed boldly, telling Jesus that she would leave if water was not provided. Soon after, pure water was found just fifteen feet below the ground in her courtyard. Nabisabhen, a disciple from Rajkot, took a small amount of water from Mataji's well and poured it into her own drying well. From that day onward, her well never dried.

Among those who inspired Mataji was Fr. Charles de Foucauld, the European hermit who lived an austere life in the desert. Another key influence was Fr. Dominic, her spiritual guide—a Benedictine monk from Belgium living at Ashirvanam, Bangalore—who possessed only one pair of clothes.

Fr. Sathyanandji, a member of Kurisumala Ashram under Francis Acharya, accompanied and supported Mataji in her spiritual journey through various hermitages across India, including Shantivanam (of Fr. Bede Griffiths), Ramanashram, Ajanta–Ellora caves, and several other ashrams, before Mataji finally settled at Atmeswar. Due to visa issues, Fr. Sathyanandji returned to France in 1976.

Francis Acharya, the Abbot of Kurisumala Ashram in Kerala, originally from Spain, was deeply inspired by Mahatma Gandhi. The ashram continues to uphold a life of simplicity, prayer, and farming—an enduring witness to authentic ascetic spirituality.

These lives remind us that the hermit's call remains alive in the Church: a silent yet powerful testimony to total surrender, simplicity, and union with God.

The community was blessed by the visit of Fr. Abraham, Vicar Provincial, and Fr. George, Finance Councillor (11–25 November), who experienced firsthand the pastoral and parish life of our fathers in Germany, strengthening bonds and fostering communion.

Carmel Niketan, Jabalpur

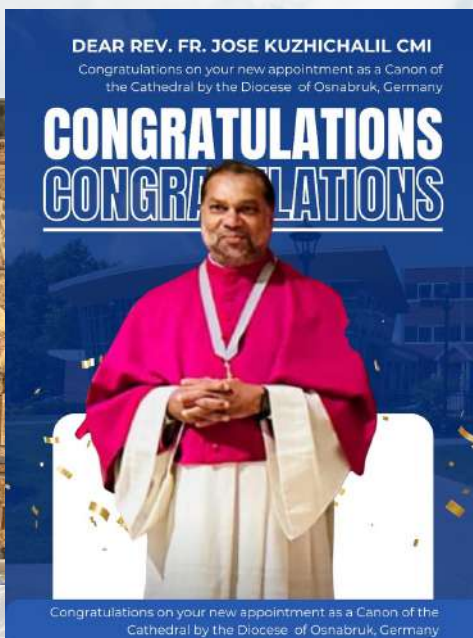

I am happy and delighted to publish the Christmas edition of Gurjari, our Province newsletter. Christmas reminds us that God is with us—Emmanuel.

The mystery of Christmas reveals a central truth of the Christian faith: Emmanuel—God with us. In this single name, the Church contemplates the fullness of God's love expressed in the Incarnation. Far from remaining distant or inaccessible, God enters human history, assumes our fragility, and chooses to dwell among His people. For the Church's missionary disciples, especially those serving among the poor and marginalized, the mystery of Emmanuel becomes the foundation, inspiration, and model for authentic Christian mission.

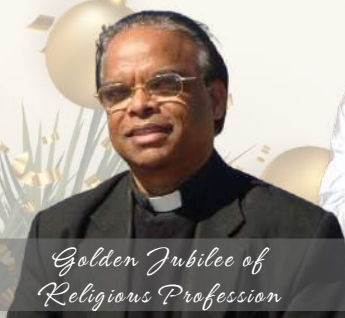
The birth of Jesus in Bethlehem is itself a missionary proclamation. The Son of God is not born in splendour but in poverty; not in a palace but in a humble manger. The first witnesses of this event are shepherds—simple people living on the margins of society. This divine preference for humility and littleness teaches an essential dimension of Catholic mission: evangelization begins with presence. God does not redeem humanity from afar; He becomes one with us.

Thus, missionaries are not merely called to do something for the poor, but to be with them—to share their struggles, hopes, fears, and joys. The Incarnation becomes the paradigm of pastoral closeness, solidarity, and communion. In the mission field we encounter poverty, injustice, sickness, and brokenness, yet it is precisely in these wounded places that Emmanuel—God with us—becomes visible. Whenever missionaries listen, heal, teach, and accompany the suffering, they continue Christ's incarnational mission, for mission is not merely a strategy but a living expression of the Incarnation. Jesus shows that Emmanuel is an active presence, healing the sick, feeding the hungry, welcoming sinners, and restoring dignity, and as the Gospel teaches (cf. Mt 25:31–46), in serving the poor we encounter Christ Himself, who reveals God's tenderness through them. Missionaries therefore become bearers of hope, making God's nearness known through simple acts of love carried out with humility and fidelity, following the example of the manger where transformation begins with tenderness and communion. As we celebrate Christmas, we rejoice that Emmanuel walks with us in every mission station and place longing for light, and by serving with Christ's compassion, we become living signs of God-with-us—wishing you all a Merry Christmas and a Prosperous New Year 2026.

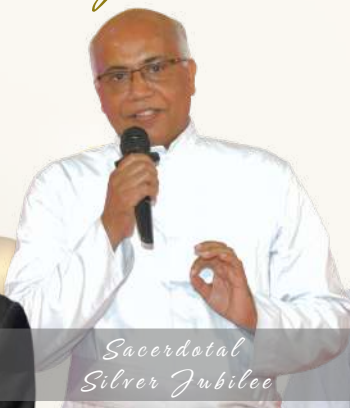

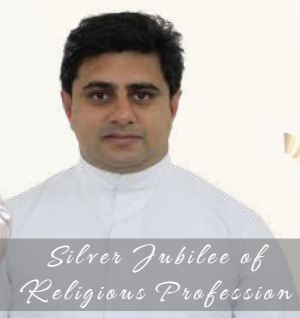
